Description

A charming early 19th-century Derby porcelain cabinet plate, hand painted with delicate rose sprigs and dating to circa 1810. Light, elegant, and beautifully decorative, it captures the refined taste of the Regency period, when English porcelain factories produced richly painted wares for formal dining and display.

The plate is decorated with finely painted roses, their softly shaded petals and fresh green leaves arranged with a natural, graceful informality. The floral decoration stands out beautifully against the pale porcelain ground, creating a composition that is both fresh and classically balanced. Hand-painted details give the piece warmth and individuality, preserving the subtle variations that make antique porcelain so appealing.

Derby was among the leading English porcelain manufacturers of the late 18th and early 19th centuries, admired for the quality of its porcelain and the skill of its painters. Floral subjects, particularly roses, were a favourite of the factory and remain among its most recognisable and collectable decorative patterns.

Originally intended for a refined table or cabinet display, this attractive plate would now make a lovely addition to a collection of Derby porcelain, Regency ceramics, or antique floral china. It also displays beautifully on a wall, in a cabinet, or as part of a decorative tablescape.
