Their tall, free-standing design, typically housing a pendulum and weights, allowed for greater timekeeping accuracy. The invention of the anchor escapement by clock maker William Clement in 1670 revolutionised their design, leading to widespread popularity. These clocks became status symbols, with ornate woodwork and intricate dials. Over centuries, they evolved in style, reflecting the craftsmanship and artistic trends of their time.
