## Description

A rare and impressive 19th-century perpetual calendar clock by the celebrated American clockmaker Seth Thomas, dated 1879. Housed in a handsome arched mahogany case, this finely made clock brings together the warmth of richly grained timber with the technical ingenuity for which Seth Thomas became renowned.

The clock is distinguished by its two-dial arrangement. The upper dial displays the time, while the lower calendar dial records the changing date, creating a captivating combination of horology and mechanical information. This feature was both useful and sophisticated in the late 19th century, transforming an everyday timepiece into an object of enduring curiosity and decorative appeal.

The gracefully arched case provides a strong architectural frame for the dials, with the deep mahogany finish lending the piece a pleasing sense of richness and presence. Its balanced proportions and clear display make it equally successful as a focal point in a library, study, drawing room, or entrance hall.

Seth Thomas was one of the most important names in American clockmaking. Founded in Connecticut in the early 19th century, the firm became celebrated for producing clocks of reliable quality, inventive design, and lasting appeal. This rare calendar clock is a fine example of that legacy, combining practical function with the character and craftsmanship of Victorian-era American design.

A notable piece for collectors of American clocks, perpetual calendars, and 19th-century scientific or domestic instruments, it offers both visual distinction and a fascinating glimpse into the ingenuity of period horology.
